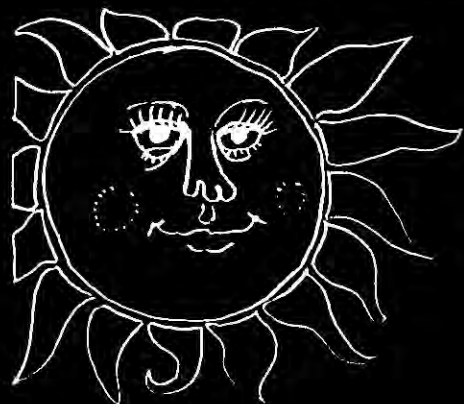

2013 Introduction

Climate & Capitalism is pleased and proud to re-publish this historic and long-unavailable document of the ecosocialist movement. It was, I believe, the first time that the word “eco-socialism” appeared in the title of any publication, and one of the first times that it appeared in print at all.

Eco-Socialism in a Nutshell was originally published in 1980, by Writers and Reader Cooperative in London, UK. Publication was arranged by Stan Rosenthal, a founding member of the Socialist Environment and Resources Association.

On the origin of the pamphlet, Stan writes:

“Having read *Nuclear Power for Beginners* [published by Writers and Readers in 1978] I was struck by how brilliantly certain parts of it encapsulated the broader message that we in SERA (the Socialist Environment & Resources Association, founded in 1973) were trying to get over to the Labour movement here.

“I therefore approached Writers & Readers (Lisa Appignanesi) to see whether they would agree to me making them up as a SERA pamphlet with an introduction by myself, which they obviously did.

“Stephen Croall, the author of *Nuclear Power for Beginners*, agreed to his work being used in the pamphlet and acknowledged his debt to SERA material for some of the ideas.

“The pamphlet was then reviewed by various newspapers, distributed to left bookshops and generally touted around at SERA events. I also sent copies to leading members of the Labour Party.”

In some ways, *Eco-Socialism in a Nutshell* shows how new and under-developed the concept of eco-socialism was in 1980. But there is much in it that today's movement can learn from, especially its insistence on a class approach to the environmental crisis.

INTRODUCTION

For some time now respected academics have been alerting us to the dangers of diminishing natural resources, mounting environmental pollution and uncontrolled technology. Until recently the Labour movement in this country has tended to regard these warnings as being at best irrelevant or at worst hostile to working class interests.

However, the post 1973 energy crisis has brought home to even the most die hard growth-at-all costs fanatic, the finite nature of one vital resource and there is a growing realisation that other raw materials are in short supply in relation to the needs of a world population expected to increase from 4000 million to 6000 million by the 21st century. Moreover, the link between our industrial way of life and many illnesses is daily becoming more evident; whilst Flixborough, Seveso, Harrisburg, supertanker accidents and oil rig disasters have shattered the myth of the fail-safe technology.

All these events have underlined the relevance of the issues raised by the ecological movement to the socialist concern for a better life for all (including future generations!). At the same time more and more ecologists are beginning to appreciate that the changes they desire can only be achieved in a socialist society which puts community need before private profit and requires all enterprises to shoulder their social responsibilities.

This fusion of ecological and socialist considerations can be termed ECO-SOCIALISM. The following pages trace in comic-strip form how it happened and how it can be developed.

The choice of the comic-strip form to present this new concept is deliberate. The comic-strip simplifies and makes the communication of ideas fun, which is how it should be. Too many important messages are sunk without trace under the weight of the words in which they appear. It also accords with the positive, cheerful, optimistic, alternative that ECO-SOCIALISM represents — in contrast to the doomster image commonly associated with the environmental movement.

Finally it will be noted that material for this booklet has been drawn from *Nuclear Power for Beginners* (with the kind permission of the authors Stephen Croall and Kaianders Sempler). We hope that these extracts will not only focus your attention on ECO-SOCIALISM but will also whet your appetite for *Nuclear Power for Beginners* (available from all good bookshops £1.95) and for Stephen Croall's next book *Ecology for Beginners* due to be published in 1981.

The bosses refused to listen...which proved to everyone that reasoned argument makes no impression on vested interests... but news of Lucas workers' approach to the class struggle spread internationally...

took root as an idea...it was:

- * discussed at workplaces from Lapland to Australia
- * proposed for other industries like steel, pulp, packaging, car-making and shipbuilding
- * raised in the British Parliament and the US Congress
- * closely examined by trade journals and some of the mass media

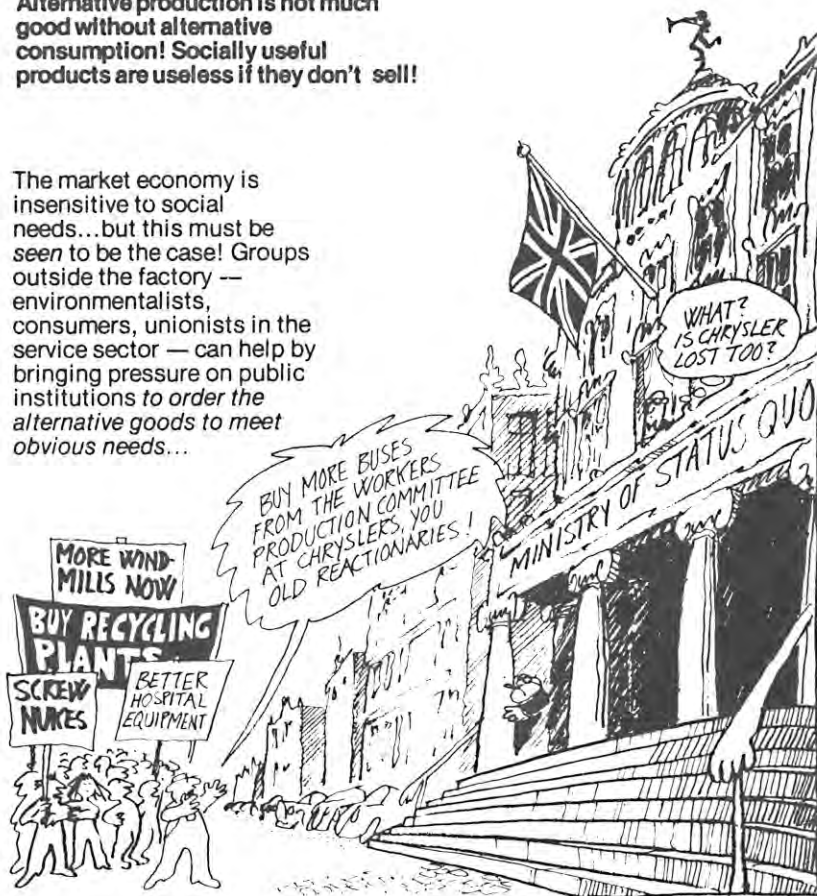
A centre for the development of socially useful products in industry was set up in London in 1978. And Lucas Combine Committee speakers travelled into Europe at the invitation of unions there...

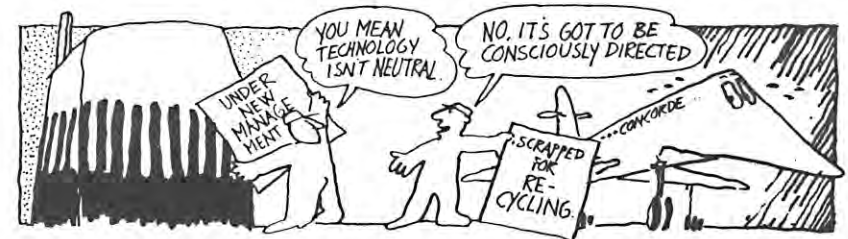

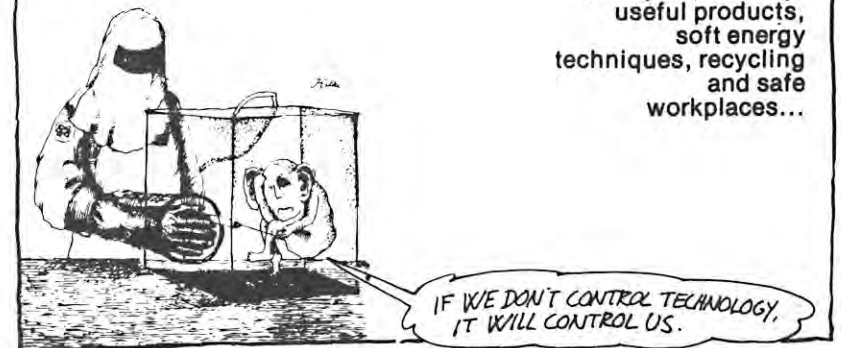

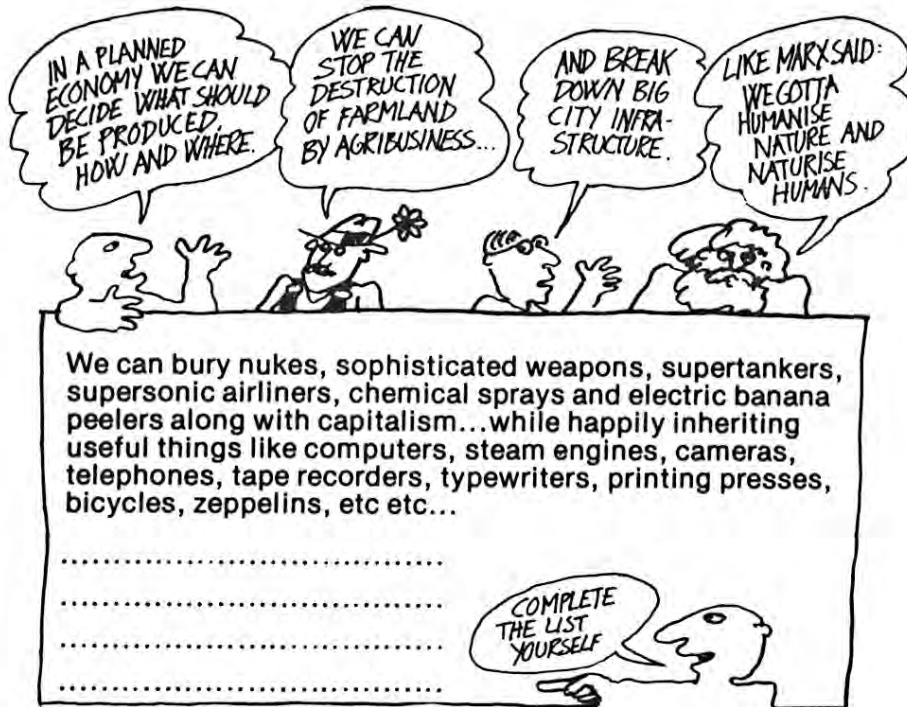


In today's market economies science and technology is largely owned and controlled by the capitalist multinationals and serves their social, political and economic goals...

WALKING ON TWO LEGS....

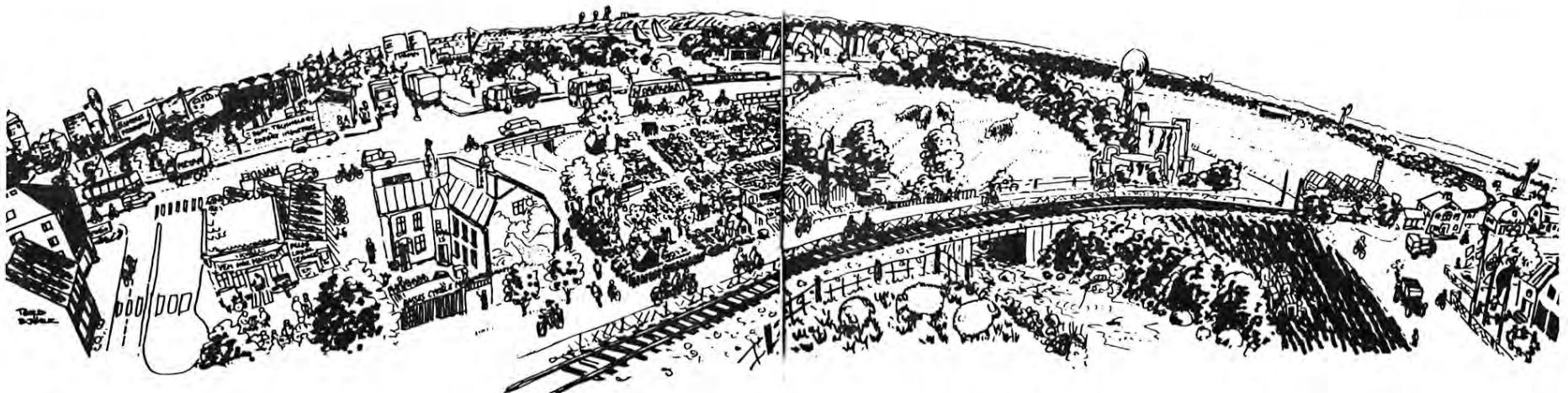


The practical circumstances are hard to foresee... But someone had a crack the other day in a British radical science journal, Undercurrents...

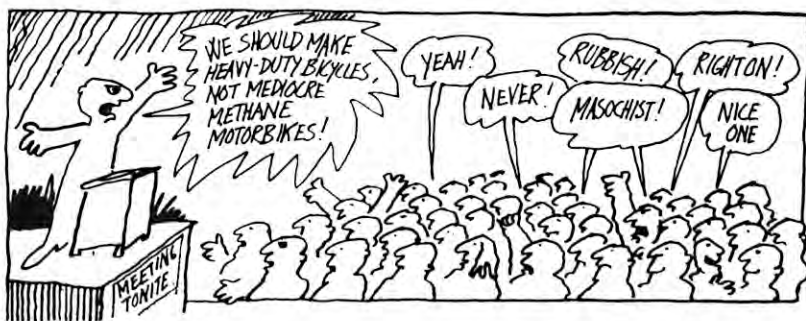


DRAFT PROPOSAL

1. Creation of committees or *councils* at local factories, housing estates and other places where people gather...
2. Council members directly elected and subject to immediate recall if they abuse responsibilities...
3. Local councils elect councils for larger units and regions...
4. Overall co-ordination...mmm...difficult...what about a directly-elected national planning body aided by council working groups with specialised fields?



5. Factory councils decide the conditions of work — job safety, division of labour, rotation of work...
6. They cooperate with other council groups in determining the future course of production...



In living areas, neighbourhood councils could be responsible for housing management, local trading, day nurseries and recreation facilities...they could sound out local opinion on what consumer goods should be produced and distribute these in the district...



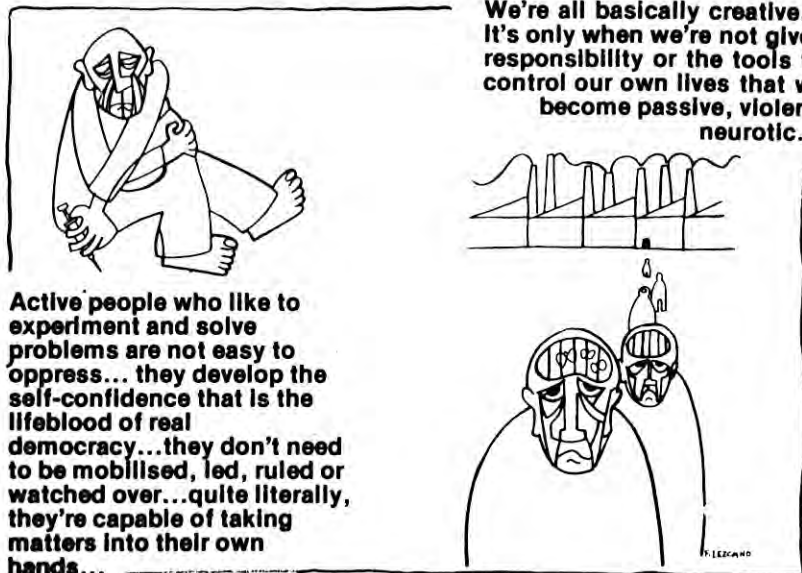
Civil rights are underpinned by widespread public involvement in mass communication, for example at community media centres...

CHOOSING THE ECO-SOCIALIST PATH AND RECOGNISING THE PHYSICAL AND BIOLOGICAL CONSTRAINTS ON HUMAN ACTIVITY DOESN'T MEAN FREEZING IN THE DARK...

It means choosing a *reasonable* material standard and a *reasonable* level of energy use instead of growing inequality and alienation...it means placing greater value on things that *count* instead of things that are merely *countable*...



There are a number of groups trying to build bridges to the new Society.

SERA (Socialist Environment and Resources Association) is one of them. We were formed in 1973 to bring these ideas to the attention of the Labour movement. Our belief in *selective growth* related to genuine human needs in a more decentralised and democratic society accords very closely with the vision behind Croall's and Sempler's brilliant cartoon presentation.

However we do not regard the society described as just a utopian pipe-dream. It can and must be made to happen. Making it happen means raising these issues on the shop floor, in the office, at meetings and conferences. It means hard grafting in working groups refining the ideas into practical policies and publishing the results. It means forging close links with other Labour movement activists and organisations and learning from their experience at the point of production.

SERA exists to bring together those who have these objectives and want to do something about realising them. Our growing membership from all wings of the Labour movement includes affiliations from national trade unions and many Constituency Labour Parties. We have already helped to influence Labour policy on the environment, industry and energy.
